

Living on the edge of the Chesspeake Bay, members of the Talbot County Garden Club are well aware of the vagaries of nature. And we are a group dedicated to learning more about what we can do to benefit the environment. Two October field trips—to the recently opened Delaware Botanic Gardens and the nearby Oxford Conservation Park—deepened our knowledge.

We toured the Delaware Botanic Gardens with board vice president Carol McCloud and Elizabeth Rives, a horticultural docent. In the Woodland Gardens, we saw a stratified forest with plants repurposed from other parts of the property and "nests" formed by tree branches gathered to tidy the understory and provide safe habitat for birds and small game. The Meadow Gardens, designed in strategic waves of native plants by the renowned Talbot County GC members found an amazing range of native plants taking hold at the new Delaware Botanic Gardens, a work in progress that begs for return visits through the seasons. landscape designer and GCA medalist Piet Oudolf, presented as a harmonious quilt of fall textures and colors. We were amazed at all that was accomplished by a modest cadre of volunteers in just three years, and we have pledged to return seasonally to experience the woodland's jonquils and the meadow's ever-changing mantle.

At the Oxford Conservation Park we observed another threeyear-old native plant meadow. Our walk focused on identifying local versus non-native invasive grasses and was led by Mikæla Boley, University of Maryland master gardener coordinator. Our up-close look gave us a better appreciation for this 86-acre wonder in our own neighborhood.

Both outings underscored the challenges and rewards of starting a meadow devoted to natives. —*Rita Mhley*
