He used pots for the long-term to meet specific moisture requirements and circumvent Zone 6 hardiness issues. He required some pots to keep exotic species in check and from becoming invasive. He admitted that in the end, the requisite seasonal movement into and out of the greenhouse became a burden. Still, he was ecstatic to share (and we were delighted to hear) the story of his "action-packed annual cycle!"

Most of the 60 attendees – more




NEW WEEKLY NEWSLETTER: "Tid Bits"
