TALBOT COUNTY GARDEN CLUB ANNUAL REPORT 2024TCGC Brings the *WOW*? Factor to the Community.

WOW In May, we staged the Talbot County Tour of the Maryland House & Garden Pilgrimage. Every member played a role in its success. In conclusion, the club proudly presented two benefiters with substantial funds to finance significant restorations of their historic infrastructure.

WOW? We began hosting horticulture-based activities for adults living with disabilities. Events, which take place at the YMCA of the Chesapeake on Peachblossom, have been well-received in the community and heart-warming for participants.

WOW Our Conservation Committee held its first native plant sale for members-only as the club promotes the benefits of natives to help our pollinators survive and the environment become more sustainable.

WOW? We facilitated the Federated Garden Clubs of Maryland's District 1 NGC Standard Flower Show at the Elks Lodge in Easton. Beautiful florals... first-class horticulture... plus, with our oversight, the introduction of contests involving a Youth Division with 70 elementary school students taking part.

WOW We offered several floral design and horticulture workshops to our members, to help us prepare our flower show entries and to teach us how to tend to our own plants and gardens in new improved ways.

(*WOW*) In October, we hosted Federated's District 1 Semi-Annual Meeting at the Miles River Yacht Club and Garden Club of America's Zone VI Leadership Council Meeting at the Tred Avon Yacht Club.

WOW? We participated in the Garden Club of the Eastern Shore's "Garden Party" Tablescapes fundraiser at Talbot Country Club, and again joined with Oxford Garden Club to create a holiday tree of hand-made treasures, themed to "All Things Oxford," for the Rotunda of the State House in Annapolis.

WOW? On the administrative side, we moved from a June-to-June fiscal year to one that coincides with the calendar year. A 6-month budget was formulated and by-laws changes were implemented to achieve this more normalized budget cycle.

WOW In the communications arena, we continued *Blossom & Bloom*, a new monthly newsletter. We brushed up our TCGC website by streamlining entries and offering new features. And we continued to present the expertise of our members on WHCP radio, 97.1 FM.

More WOW We invited the public to four free garden lectures... continued to present occasional floral bouquets to Talbot Hospice and Talbot Interfaith Shelter... sponsored several creative adventures for our Young Gardeners Club at the Library... visited gardens in Virginia (twice) and toured the Philadelphia Flower Show and Longwood Gardens at Christmas... maintained four in-town gardens, provided Busy Bee garden services as needed, added touches of greenery around town, judged May Day florals, decorated for the Waterfowl Festival, decked out the Town's most iconic buildings for the holidays... won several awards... and, last but not least: met, lunched and enjoyed each other's company!

Garden club presents funds to 2 historic Trappe churches

EASTON — Talbot County Garden Club hosted a lemonade social at Scotts United Methodist Church in Trappe on July 16 to celebrate the success of the 2024 Talbot County Tour of the Maryland House & Garden Pilgrimage.

Dedicated to the restoration and preservation of historic properties, the May 11 Tour drew more than 2,000 "pilgrims" to seven outstanding private properties in Talbot County.

Tour proceeds from ticket sales and sponsorships greatly amplified by service providers' discounts and donations — will cover major infrastructure projects at two historic churches in Trappe: Scotts and St. Paul's Episcopal.

Scotts had an extensive stormwater drainage issue that threatened the church's 225-year-old foundation. Lane Engineering civil engineers donated survey and mitigation planning services to address the issue. McHale Landscape Design Inc. completed the mitigation work at a huge discount.

At St. Paul's, the 1858 brick facade of the church and ruins of the older parish

church needed repair. Tour funds covered extensive brick repair and repointing at a sizable discount, thanks to Marth Masonry.

According to St. Paul's Vestry representative George H. Meyer Jr., "The Tour funds have sparked a new energy for the church. Not only do we have 'new' bricks, we are tackling deferred maintenance ourselves — painting inside, installing a handicap ramp and more." In acknowledging the donation, Scotts pastor

Charles A. Bell Jr, said, "Tour funds will help preserve our church for future generations. Without a strong foundation, this church would not stand." Attending the celebration in addition to representatives of both churches

May 11 was a glorious, blue sky, fresh air day!

By its numbers and accolades...

the 2024 TALBOT COUNTY TOUR turned out quite well, thanks to 18 months of meticulous planning...

2,038 Pilgrims toured. 1,752 purchased tickets (the balance were MHGP affiliates from around the state).

7 homeowners generously opened their doors to welcome Pilgrims to their singular private properties. One home-

singular private properties. One homeowner personally greeted 1,300 at her door!

2 iconic churches in Trappe will undergo needed restoration with proceeds from the Tour. 2 historic gardens in Easton will share in the proceeds through the garden club's ongoing maintenance programs.

Including garden clubbers, 300 members of the community volunteered to serve as day-of hostesses, ticket sellers, car parkers, golf cart drivers, bus ambassadors, etc.

30 garden club members headed sub-committees, led by 2 indefatigable co-chairs. 1 member sold 254 tour bell tickets, pre-sale. 1 member graciously opened her house for a lovely Homeowners' Party.

2 volunteers helped distribute 200+ lunches at Scotts United Methodist Church, where church members prepared a chicken salad that drew raves and recipe requests.

Raves also arrived for the quality of the Tour properties and the abundance of florals and their incredible design. While some floral materials were purchased, many flowers were donated, plucked fresh from garden club members' gardens. One Pilgrim was overheard exclaiming: "They must have picked every peony in the county!" According to another Pilgrim quoted in the STAR DEMOCRAT by an on-scene reporter: "Oh my gosh... The flower arrangements that are in (the) sun porch and on the kitchen table are the most beautiful I've ever seen in my entire life."

The ultimate rave came from a homeowner who told our co-chair that she and her spouse feel they are stewards of their property and appreciated this opportunity to share their home and history with the Talbot County community.



Virginia Sappington, an active member of Talbot County Garden Club for more than 50 years, is eager to learn about anything garden related, and she is a willing leader of projects and committees. She served as club president (1989–91), as membership chair for several decades, and she received a Club Appreciation Award in 2012 for her leadership. According to Carolyn Rugg, immediate past president of Talbot County GC, Virginia "shows boundless, get-it-done energy," abundantly demonstrated when Virginia spearheaded the 1989 design and implementation of the Five Corners Fountain Garden in Easton, Maryland, an iconic spot at a major local crossroads. In 2023 Easton's mayor presented the dub with a key to the town due in large part to Virginia and her co-captain's facelift of the fountain garden.

During Virginia's presidency, Talbot County GC began hosting an annual wreath-making event to produce Christmas decorations for a number of Easton's landmarks and to create cheerful holiday tabletop arrangements in mugs for those who rely on Meals on Wheels. She also guided the club's biennial fundraisers in support of historic projects and community grants in Talbot County.

When she is not volunteering with club projects, she and another club member operate Garden Design of Easton, Inc. The firm follows green principles and uses native plants in the creation of pollinator gardens. They are responsible for the design of pastoral common areas for Cooke's Hope, a residential development outside Easton. Virginia is a true garden and community champion. —Beveley Young.
