


February 2025 President's Letter

January Minutes

Talbot County Garden Club General meeting 1/28/25

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 at the Talbot County Library.

Maribeth welcomed everyone to the first meeting of the new fiscal year.

The minutes of the December 3, 2024 general meeting were approved as sent.

President's report:

The District 1 annual meeting will be March 5 at The Fountains Wedding and Conference Center in Salisbury. Floral Designer Julia Clevett will be the speaker. The designs she will create will be raffled. If anyone plans to go she should give a check to Maribeth so Maribeth can submit one check from TCGC.

FGCMD Annual Meeting will be March 25 at Turf Valley Resort in Ellicott City, presentation by Horticulturist Ron McIntosh. We would like to see good representation by TCGC members as this is Susie Middleton's last meeting as State President.

Everyone is encouraged to look at the winter issue of GCA Bulletin and review the finalists for the Founders Fund grant recipients. The finalists are: Marshlands Conservancy (NY), Virginia War Memorial Green Space (Richmond) and Forsyth Park Educational Shade Garden (Savannah). The winning project will receive \$40,000. TCGC will vote on the finalists at the February 25 general meeting.

The GCA National Affairs & Legislation (NAL) meeting will be held in Washington DC March 23-26, with a virtual session March 20. TCGC has budgeted \$500 to send a representative. Anyone who is interested in attending should contact Maribeth.

The Oxford Garden Club will be holding its tour on May 17 and is looking for docents.

Vice President's report:

Eleanor and Caroline Benson presented the plans for the 2026 Pilgrimage. In keeping with America250 the Pilgrimage will celebrate the colonial history of Talbot County. The homes on the tour will be in St Michaels, Oxford and Easton, and the tour will include "drive-bys" to highlight the history of each town. The Pilgrimage project will be the brickwork of the Neale House in the Historic Society Garden. Most of the houses, the route, and the plan are in place, but a chair and co-chair are still needed. Anyone who might be interested or have questions should contact Eleanor or Caroline.

Treasurer's report:

Operating: \$35,158.31 Restricted: \$16,675 CD: \$27,388

Corresponding Secretary's report:

Cards have been sent to Laura Carney on the loss of her mother-in-law, Sue Carney, and Sally McLuckie who has a torn ACL.

Membership:

A book, <u>Wilderness</u>, will be donated to the Talbot County Library in honor of Sue Carney, longtime former member of TCGC.

Finance:

The capital account ended the year with a market value of \$668,303 versus a market value of \$604,961 at the beginning of the year for an overall gain of \$63,342. The accrued income for 2024 was \$18,900. The current allocation in the account is 4.06% cash, 61.08% equities and 34.86% fixed income.

The market value of the account as of 1/20/25 is \$681,613, up 1.35% YTD. For the 12 month period, the account is up 12.67%.

Starting in January, all dividend and interest accruing each month to the capital account will be moved to the separate money market fund in order to build up cash for disbursements for 2025 and beyond. The money market fund is now yielding 4.54%.

Horticulture:

The program on January 27, "Herb Bitters and Human Biology" by Terry Holman, had 20 attendees and went well. February's lecture, "Cottage Gardening with a Sprinkling of Herbs," is scheduled for February 11 at 10am at the Parish Hall of Holy Trinity Church in Oxford. On March 11 Janet Mackey will present a program on seed starting.

Awards:

TCGC has submitted several candidates for awards to be given out at the District 1 annual meeting and at the FGCMD annual meeting.

Garden Therapy:

Flowers for Hospice and the Interfaith Shelter will be February 12. Maribeth asked for more participants than there have been recently.

Trips:

The Philadelphia Flower Show trip will be March 6. The theme is "Gardens of Tomorrow." Most attendees will drive up the day before, stay at the Marriott at the Convention Center, and have dinner as a group. Virginia needs the number of those having dinner with the group. On March 6 there will be a private 2 hour tour beginning at 8:00. Fran can take payment for the trip via credit card.

A trip to Chanticleer in Wayne PA will be April 30, followed by lunch at Aronimink Golf Club. The trip is limited to 30 people. A flyer will go out in March.

The trip to gardens in the Hudson River Valley will be May 27-June 2, 2026. The trip needs 14 people, and will be offered to TCGC members first.

The committee is looking into a trip to The Grounds for Sculpture near Trenton NJ in the fall. If anyone has any other ideas for trips they should be shared with Chloe or another member of the committee. 





From the Conservation Corner:



As your much-anticipated vacation approaches, it's important to think about how to leave your home in a way that supports environmental conservation. Here are some simple tips to prepare your home for vacation while being kind to the planet.

- 1. Adjust Your Thermostat: Set your thermostat to an energy-saving temperature. Turn the thermostat down to the '50s in the winter (warm enough to prevent pipes from freezing), or up to the mid-'70s during the summer.
- 2. Unplug Everything: Before you leave, unplug all electronics that won't be in use, like your toaster, chargers, computers and entertainment systems. This step not only saves energy but also protects your devices from power surges.
- 3. Take Care of Your Plants and Yard: Mow the lawn and tend to any outdoor plants before you leave. Ask a friend to water your indoor and outdoor plants or invest in plant nannies or an irrigation system respectively.
- 4. Stop Mail and Newspaper Delivery: Put a hold on mail delivery services while you're away. This link will take you to the USPS website. You can usually put a "vacation stop" on your newspaper delivery on the publisher's website. Alternatively, arrange for a neighbor or friend to collect your mail and packages to prevent signs of an empty house (which can attract unwanted attention).
- 5. Secure Your Windows and Doors: Ensuring your windows and doors are properly secured can help avoid any unplanned energy waste. If you have blinds or curtains, close them to help insulate your home, which can reduce your energy costs.
- 6. Turn Off Water and Check for Leaks: If you're going away for an extended period, consider turning off the main water supply to avoid any leaks or potential water damage. Check for leaks before you leave to conserve water and avoid dealing with issues when you return.
- 7. Clean Up Before You Go: Before you pack your bags, do a quick tidy-up around the house. Clean out the fridge of perishables, do the dishes, and make sure your washer and dryer are empty so you are not leaving wet clothes that might become musty after a while.
- 8. Take Out the Trash: Don't leave food scraps in your trash cans. Take out any garbage, especially food waste, to minimize the risk of attracting pests while you're away. Composting any organic waste left behind is also a great eco-friendly option.

If you think that botanical names are just a lot of jibber-jabber that are not necessary, just think about Lewis Carroll's Jabberwocky and, even though it uses silliness, you still get the gist of what is going on. The same thing happens with botanical names, as their foundation of Latin, Greek or Roman word structure helps you tell something about most plant material. These plant names tell you more about the plant than common names do, since many plants have local names (and pronunciation). Parrotia persica translates to Persian Parrotia, fairly simple, but Poncirus trifoliata does tell you it has clusters of 3 leaves, but nothing about it being a hardy orange.

Then there is Liquidambar styraciflua, the Sweet Gum, also known as Gumball Tree, Star Leaved Gum, Alligator Wood, Red Gum and a host of other names, which is why the botanical name is so important. The Sweet Gum is a beautiful fall tree and provides us with those spiky gumballs to use for holiday decorations.



Evergreens



Most of us think of evergreens as strictly conifers, but there are many different plant species that can be evergreen. (There are deciduous conifers, and one of them, the Dawn Redwood (Metasequoia glyptostroboides) has beautiful amber fall color prior to the needle drop.) During the late fall and winter months we appreciate evergreens filling in the landscape otherwise left barren by perennials and deciduous trees and shrubs. The stars

include the holly and magnolia trees, viburnum, sweet box, boxwood, Chinese holly, osmanthus, winterberry and nandina. The extra benefit is that most evergreens make wonderful decorations used for celebratory




occasions during the winter holidays. Winterberry (Ilex verticillata) is a deciduous holly that is a nice home for birds and has bright red berries in the winter, which

after a couple of frosts, feed the birds. Osmanthus (Osmanthus fragrans) the Tea Olive is a medium sized

shrub that thrives in sun to partial shade and is drought resistant. The variety "Goshiki" has beautiful, variegated holly-like leaves.



One evergreen shrub that has been grown for centuries is the boxwood. Recently both species, (Buxus sempervirens) American Boxwood and (Buxus suffruticosa) English Boxwood, grown in this area have been troubled by boxwood blight. However, the news for boxwood fans is good, as there are several new varieties developed in Europe that show good



Europe." The named variety "Renaissance" will become our new border edge boxwood as it only reaches 2', so the roses or perennials within the border are still visible.

We have pointed out many times that winter is a great time to review your landscape and see where you may need to add an evergreen filler to close a gap or screen something new. Maybe a neighbor has added a shed which you don't want to look at from your deck, or their kids are older now and want to work on that beat up car all hours of the night using floodlights directed at your bedroom windows. You need screening!



GRASSES

Ornamental grasses are colorful, hearty, easy to maintain, help prevent erosion and display multiseason interests. From containers and hedges to borders and mass plantings, garden grasses or ornamental grasses have something for everyone. Pink grasses can be showstoppers. Pink Muhly grass (Muhlenbergia capillaris) grows in much of the U.S. They offer late season color in the fall with their



feathery pink plumes. This grass flourishes in warm, dry climates and full sun. It thrives in clay soil and requires little water, and very little fertilizer.

Unfortunately, some grasses which we have been planting are now on the invasive or somewhat invasive list. Two of these, Miscanthus and Pennisetum had become favorites in the landscape industry which may have been the reason for the spread of seeds.

Over the past few days, our mailboxes and In-boxes have been filled with garden catalogs which will keep us warm over the next couple of months when it is too cold for man nor beast to be gardening. We hope this report finds you celebrating a Happy New Year and the thoughts of walking through your beautiful and well landscaped garden this year.



What do I do with My Amaryllis Bulb...

After the flowers have faded, cut off the stems to within an inch of the top of the bulb. If you grew the bulb in water rather than soil, transfer it to a pot filled with moist growing mix (making sure the top 1/3 of the bulb is exposed). Put the pot in a bright window and continue watering as needed, keeping the soil



barely moist. Fertilize monthly, using a standard liquid houseplant fertilizer.

When spring arrives and the weather has settled (several weeks after any danger of frost has passed), put the potted bulb outdoors in a partially shaded location where it will be protected from the wind and won't get too wet. Continue to care for your amaryllis as you would a houseplant, watering and fertilizing as needed.

When fall approaches (well before any danger of frost), bring the potted bulb indoors. Put it in a cool, relatively dark place (garage or basement) and stop watering. This will tell the bulb that it's time to rest and initiate flower formation. After 6 to 12 weeks, gently remove the bulb from the pot and pull off any dry leaves. Replant the bulb in fresh potting soil and care for it as you would a newly purchased bulb.
