The Club won many awards at the District and State level. I will share these with you when we meet in May.



From the Conservation Committee:



April showers bring May flowers ... and May is now Maryland Native Plant Month when nurseries and native plant retailers will have increased inventory. The Conservation Committee encourages you to add natives to your gardens and landscapes. Every native tree, shrub, and plant makes a difference. Why? Because natives support biodiversity and build healthy ecosystems that provide food and shelter for native bees, birds, butterflies, caterpillars, and other wildlife.

Under the stellar leadership of Dana Vlk, the Conservation Committee has identified feasible projects to raise awareness of the importance of native plants. We're gathering resources to share - - 2nd annual Plant Sale returns in September! - - and getting the word out. Here's a handy poster with actions each one of us can take to make a difference. Try one (or more) in April and let us know how it goes.

What can you do to help?







There are LOTS of things each of us can do to make a difference, including:

in your yard

- Plant many more native plants in your yard to feed wildlife
- Add native plants to your ornamental gardens
- Plant large native trees to expand the national tree canopy
- Plant trees and shrubs that produce seeds and berries for birds
- Use native plants with deep roots to reduce soil erosion
- Plant drought tolerant native plants that use less water
- Eliminate the use of pesticides in your yard
- Replace food-free, sterile lawn areas with native plant habitats
- Add a source of water in your yard for wildlife

in your community

- Plan or participate in native plant events in your community
- Help install pollinator gardens at schools and in public areas
- Teach children about why native plants are so important
- Design, plant, and observe a pollinator garden with a child
- Buy native plants from local growers
- Collect and grow native plants from seed collected nearby

at home

- Plant a pollinator garden in your yard to expand pollinator pathways
- Keep yard waste on-site by composting
- Use compost to amend soil and save valuable peat bogs
- Turn off outdoor lights at night to help migrating birds
- Use lids over outdoor lights so they don't shine upward
- If outdoor lights are needed, use motion detectors

One last note on Parking:


We are asking everyone to carpool to minimize parking at our members' homes. There are three carpool meeting spots where members can meet to carpool:
